MARCH - To Do's

Jobs on the plot!

With such a wet Spring, it may mean a slighter later than usual start to prepping the plot than usual. If beds have been covered over, or are not too waterlogged now is the ideal time to begin weeding as warmer weather (hopefully!) means weed growth resumes with a vengeance. Keep on top of weeds by regularly hoeing and hand weeding.

Tidy up herbs

Apply fertilizers to boost the nutritional content of your soil before sowing and planting begins.

Cut flower patch

- Sow half-hardy annuals under cover
- Direct sow hardy annuals once the ground warms up
- Plant summer flowering bulbs
- Prick out and pot on seedlings as necessary
- Harvest anenomes, ranunculus, earlyflowering narcissi and daffodils
- Order biennial and perennial seed to sow in June
- Order late-flowering and autumn flowering bulbs
- Make a batch of compost tea to fee the soil weekly throughout the summer

Sow

Sow a few seeds outdoors, if the soil has been covered and warmed in preparation. Otherwise sow under coches or indoors.

Cut flower patch

Plant

- Pot up dahlias and put under cover to sprout
- Direct sow hardy annuals
- Sow tender annuals under cover
- Plant Autumn-flowering bulbs
- Keep pricking out and potting on seedlings
- Harvest anenomes, cowslips, cow parsley, tulips, forget-me nots, iris, narcissi, daffodils and ranunculus
- Make nettle tea

JOBS on the plot!

The weather can still be every unpredictable – so keep an eye on forecasts and consider the state of your soil before rushing to open the seed packets. The list of things to direct sow is vast. Don't be tempted to over sow – plan for progressional sowing – leaving space to do so. Be ready with horticultural fleece to protect from any late frosts. Support peas – twiggy sticks are best and free! Feed fruit bushes, trees and canes with slow-release general fertilizer and then apply a mulci of well-rotted manure or compost.

May is a seductive month - longer days and warmer temperatures but take care there is always a risk of late frosts.

Keep on top of the weeding.

Take note of any pests – deal with promptly. Try to use organic methods of pest control.
